The Gwynne Room has had a big focus on Mathematics, particularly whole number. Many of the students have been working hard on improving their skip counting, counting by 2's 5's and 10's. The game, 'Buzz,' has been a big hit, especially when you win a lolly. Others have been busy counting by ones and working on number formation. Place value is our new focus with lots of work using concrete materials, especially MAB blocks. Our new maths platform, Essential Assessments, has many students excited, as they can see

the improvements they are making. It such a privilege to see them pleased with their personal achievements.

We have also been learning and problem solving on the topic of bullying. We have been having discussions on what a bully is and strategies to use if we are being

bullied. Many of these strategies work well with any situations not only for bullies. A strategy we have learnt about involves telling our peer to stop, and making an I statement, remembering that if it stops, we need to forget about it. If it does continue that is when we tell a teacher and let them help. A big part of our learning is not to argue back and forth with our peer. These are great strategies for our students to learn as you never know when and where they may find themselves in a situation where they need these skills.



### **Mitchell Room**

The boys of Mitchell room all cruised into the beginning of 2021 without a hitch. They were excited to see each other and enthusiastic to start a new year altogether again. In literacy lessons this term we have been practicing spelling, re-counts, and comprehension. Students have been actively watching Behind the News and discussing the issues in



their world that they face today. We have been focussing on improving numeracy skills by having two lessons per day. So far we have practiced three digit addition, subtraction, place value, number lines, and location. Each student has shown a good understanding of each activity. # **CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)**

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum. CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form.
